Reports

1 Chair's Report B 2011 (6) 1

The Board noted the report. The Chair informed the Board that the July meeting would start at 2.30pm on the afternoon Monday 18 July, continuing the next day. A dinner would be arranged for the Monday evening.

2 Chief Executive's Report B 2011 (6) 2

The Board noted the report

3 Minutes of the Board meeting on 24 May 2011 B 2011 (6) 3

The minutes were agreed, and signed by the Chair.

4 Matters Arising from the Minutes Oral

There were no matters arising.

5 Declarations of Interests Oral

Richard Morris noted that, in relation to the Dornier Do-17 Recovery, that he had undertaken freelance editorial work for the RAF Museum, including work on the Battle of Britain. The Board were content that this did not constitute a conflict of interests.

6 Finance and Corporate Services Report

B 2011 (6) 6

The Board noted the report. Demand for Heritage Grants remained high and the value of first round applications for decision in September was £53.4m.

7 Strategic Framework Consultation

B 2011 (6) 7

Opinion Leader's Research Director, gave a presentation summarising the key findings from the recent strategic consultation, based on Opinion Leader's analysis of the responses to the main consultation questionnaire.

An open consultation had been undertaken between 31 January and 21 April 2011, allowing those both known and not known to HLF to contribute. Two questionnaires had been produced, one for stakeholders and a shorter questionnaire with fewer questions for the general public. The Board was informed that responses with a critical mass less than 5% could be discounted whilst those of 25% and above indicated a strong finding which should be noted. They were assured that the level of response from the general public was on par with the response from stakeholders justifying the decision to have a shorter less complicated questionnaire in order to encourage a higher response rate and so make the consultation more robust.

The Board noted the key strategic consultation findings. The Chair invited Trustees to email further suggested topics for the July discussion to Judy Cligman, Director of Strategy and Business Development, after they had had a chance to consider the final report. A link to the final report would be forward to Trustees shortly.

The Board noted that the discussion in July would inform further work in preparation for discussions in October 2011 about HLF's future strategic direction.

8 Strategy and Business Development Report

B 2011 (6) 8

Judith Cligman, Director of Strategy and Business Development, introduced the report.

Value for Money – the Board revisited a paper initially presented in 2007 which articulated issues pertinent to making value for money judgements on grant applications, most notably when applications were competing for funding.

Philanthropy – The Board noted progress in discussions with DCMS and Arts Council England (ACE) on an initiative, to be named Catalyst, to incentivise more private giving to heritage and to help build the financial resilience and capacity of the heritage voluntary sector.

Policy change on digital projects - In October 2010 the Board had agreed, subject to consultation, to alter policy to allow HLF to fund projects in which the creation of, and public engagement with, digital materials was the main focus. The key change would be that projects could use digital technology to help people learn about the heritage without the existing requirement for additional learning activity. 64% of those who responded to the consultation supported HLF's proposals for digital heritage, including 33% showing very strong support. Of those respondents who gave reasons for their support, the most common was that the proposals were a good way to extend the reach of heritage projects and issues to an audience who would not necessarily engage with it and allow the users themselves to interact with and sometimes control the content. The Board therefore confirmed their support for this change of policy. Guidance would be produced for applicants, and training for staff and decision-makers. It was expected that applications could be accepted from April 2012.

BBC small grants collaboration - The Board noted developments in planning for a strategic initiative in association with the BBC series provisionally titled 'Story of a Nation' which would be broadcast in 2012.

9 Risk Management Review

B 2011 (6) 9

Judith Cligman, Director of Strategy and Business Development, presented the paper which focussed on Risk 3 on the 2011 Risk Register: *that our strategy fails to keep pace with the needs of the heritage and changes in the external environment and therefore is not supported by our stakeholders.*

Trustees noted that the risk had reduced as HLF was actively engaged in consultation and discussions and were satisfied that it was being managed appropriately.

9a Feedback from Finance and Resources Committee

B 2011 (6) 9a

Richard Wilkin, Chair of the Finance and Resources Committee, provided feedback following the meeting on 27 June.

There had been an increase in requests from grantees to make post completion changes to projects.

DCMS had recently issued an updated projection of Lottery income based on record annual sales of £5.8bn. The revised projection would allow HLF to increase its grant budget.

The Committee had considered the regional performance statistics, which showed good performance by staff.

10 Annual Report of Audit Committee

Doug Hulyer, Chair of the Audit Committee, reported on the Annual Report 2010-11.

The scope and operation of audit, both internal and external, and the Audit Committee had been most satisfactory during the year. Whilst it had been agreed that no changes were required to the operation of the Audit Committee, suggestions had been made to expand the role of the Committee in a way that could help the Board achieve its aims.

Trustees agreed that it would be good practice for the Chair of the Audit Committee to meet, on annual basis, with the Chair of the Board and the Chair of the Finance & Resources Committee.

11 Minutes of Audit Committee on 13 June 2011 and Annual report and accounts of NHMF and HLF

The Board noted the minutes and the Annual report and accounts of NHMF and HLF.

The Board approved the publication of the NHMF and the HLF accounts, noting the deadline for any amendments to the text was Friday 1 July.

Louise Lane, Director of Communications presented the report.

Trustees noted that announcements for the successful Parks for People applications would be made on 11 July. The announcement for the Cuthbert Gospel would be made on 13 July.

The Board noted the report, including information on pre-applications, withdrawn and export-stopped items.

13a Acquisition of Jane Austen Manuscript CONFIDENTIAL

B 2011 (6) 13a

The Bodleian Library had expressed an interest in acquiring a rare manuscript of an unfinished novel entitled *The Watsons* by Jane Austen. The manuscript consisted of 68 pages, all in Austen's handwriting and included edits, notes and revisions. It was thought to represent the only surviving original manuscript of an Austen novel apart from two cancelled chapters of *Persuasion*.

The manuscript was due to be sold at auction on 14 July.

The Board noted that this was a fast track application and a between meetings decision would be required as the auction date, 14 July 2011, was before the next Board meeting. The full application would be circulated to Trustees on 7 July 2011 for decision by 13 July 2011.

Heritage Lottery Fund

16 HLF Operations Report

B 2011 (6) 16

Bob Bewley, Director of Operations presented the report.

Long Eaton Townscape Heritage Initiative: TH-06-00316/2: Erewash Borough Council (EBC) had received an award of £957,000 in September 2008 towards the delivery of the Long Eaton Townscape Heritage Initiative project. After the withdrawal of the Regional Development Agency and the Derbyshire Economic Partnership (DEP) partnership funding by September 2011, there would be a reduction of £210,174 from the common fund. The grantee had requested an increase in the grant percentage from 45% to 50% to enable the full drawdown of the HLF grant. Trustees noted that other funding sources had been investigated to no avail. With the increase in grant percentage the project would continue to meet the approved purposes.

Trustees agreed to the change in grant percentage from 45% to 50%, whilst maintaining the HLF grant amount at £957,000.

Second round applications for discussion and decision

17 Parks for People overview (to inform HLF cases)

B 2011 (6) 17

The Board noted the sections of the Parks for People overview to inform decisions about the HLF only funded cases. Having agreed in April that they would be prepared to spend more than the annual budget for Parks for People grants if they considered this was merited by the quality of the applications, the Board agreed to consider each application on its merits, with particular scrutiny of any uplift in grant requested and whether this continued to represent value for money.

18 Exhibition & Brandling Park: PP-08-18711

B 2011 (6) 18

DECISION: AWARD GRANT OF £2,404,900 (75%)

Newcastle City Council sought a grant towards the restoration of the 15 hectare Exhibition and Brandling Park. The project would conserve, restore and improve the existing landscape, structures and features. Access would be enhanced including that to the Military Vehicle Museum and there would be wider interpretation of historic and environmental features. A community development worker would be employed to involve the local community in the proposals and to develop educational activities. The applicant had received a first round pass of £2,057,600, including a development grant of £98,600 in June 2009.

The Board awarded a grant of £2,404,900 (75% of eligible delivery costs).

19 Victoria Park: PP-09-02521

B 2011 (6) 19

DECISION: AWARD GRANT OF £3,087,000 (75%)

St Helens Metropolitan Borough Council sought funding towards the restoration of Victoria Park in St Helens, Merseyside. This 14 hectare, urban park contained a Grade II listed mansion, a Grade II listed lodge, a Grade II listed folly, an 1840s fountain and a walled garden.

The Board awarded a grant of £3,087,000 (75% of eligible delivery costs).

20 Dalmuir Park, Clydebank: PP-09-03895 B 2011 (6) 20
DECISION: AWARD GRANT OF £859,600 (50%)

West Dunbartonshire Council sought a grant of £859,600 (50% of delivery costs) towards a programme of capital restoration works, improvements to the facilities offered at Dalmuir Park in Clydebank, increased levels of signage and interpretation and various opportunities for the community to engage and learn about their local heritage. A first round pass of £732,600 including a development award of £11,700 had been made in December 2009.

The Board agreed the proposals offered potential to increase volunteer involvement in the park's management, community events and educational opportunities. They awarded a grant of £859,600 (50% of eligible delivery costs).

21 Penllergare Valley Woods: PP-08-18902 B 2011 (6) 21
DECISION: AWARD GRANT OF £2,320,800 (79%)

The Penllergare Trust sought funding towards the restoration of Penllergare Valley Woods, on the north-west fringe of Swansea. Penllergare was a largely derelict 100 hectare, Grade II listed landscape containing two 'at risk' Scheduled Ancient Monuments, a historic astronomical observatory and the remains of a pioneering Victorian orchid house. The site was also important because of its connections to a number of prominent figures in Victorian society who were pioneers in technology, science and photography.

The Board awarded a grant of £2,320,800 (79% of eligible delivery costs).

22 Felixstowe Seafront Gardens B 2011 (6) 22
DECISION: AWARD GRANT OF £2,194,100 (79%)

Suffolk Coastal District Council sought a grant towards the restoration and enhancement of Felixstowe Seafront Gardens. The three hectare linear park was listed grade II in the English Heritage Register of Parks and Gardens of Special Historic Interest. Capital works included a range of conservation and repair improvements and better access, new lighting and security and a programme of activities to encourage wider use and community involvement. A new Heritage Trail would run the length of the Gardens. A first round pass of £1,971,500, including development grant of £152,300 had been approved in June 2009.

The Board awarded a grant of £2,194,100 (79% of eligible delivery costs).

23 Walpole Park: PP-09-03120 B 2011 (6) 23
DECISION: AWARD GRANT OF £2,420,000 (46%)

London Borough of Ealing sought funding towards the restoration of heritage features and enhancement of public facilities in Walpole Park. The Grade II listed, 12 hectare park formed the setting for the Grade I listed Pitzhanger Manor, Sir John Soane's country residence. Listed structures in the Park included the Kitchen Garden's Grade II listed boundary wall and the Grade I listed Entrance Archway. The Park, located within a designated Heritage Quarter, backed on to Ealing Studios. The project vision was to reunite Pitzhanger Manor with its landscape whilst contributing to wider regeneration plans for Ealing town centre.

The Board awarded a grant of £2,420,000 (46% of eligible delivery costs).

24 Raphael Park: PP-08-18716
DECISION: AWARD GRANT OF £1,787,700 (67%)

B 2011 (6) 24

The London Borough of Havering sought funding towards the restoration of Raphael Park and the adaptation of the Park Keeper's Lodge for re-use as a park centre. The centre would be used as a base for the Park Manager, community and educational resource and a café. The 17.8 hectare park was a designated Site of Local Importance for Nature Conservation located within a conservation area containing the Grade II listed Black's Bridge.

The Board awarded a grant of £1,787,700 (67% of eligible delivery costs).

Reflections following discussion of items 18 to 24

After considering the second round applications, the Board noted that, as a result of the uplifts, the funding requested represented an increase of £2.5m on the amount approved at first round. Officers undertook to analyse the trend in requests for uplifts for parks projects under SP2 and so far during SP3, including the reasons for these, which may result from changes in the wider funding landscape and economic situation.

The Board requested that for the future, where conditions would apply to a grant these be clearly listed in the case paper and that applicants be:

- encouraged to actively involve volunteers in planning projects
- asked to provide more information about current visitors, how patterns change after the project and asked to set clear targets to diversify audiences
- demonstrate how connectivity with other green infrastructure in the area could be improved.

First round applications for discussion and decision (HLF)

- 25 Belleisle Park: PP-09-02272** **B 2011 (6) 25**
DECISION: FIRST ROUND PASS OF £1,506,000, INCLUDING DEVELOPMENT GRANT OF £56,000 (75% OF TOTAL ELIGIBLE DEVELOPMENT COSTS)

South Ayrshire Council sought a first round pass of £1,506,000 including a development grant of £56,000 (75% of eligible development costs) towards a comprehensive restoration project and a programme of participation and learning opportunities designed to increase audiences and encourage volunteering.

The Board agreed the project offered potential to deliver strong social and economic benefits for South Ayrshire. They approved a first round pass of £1,506,000, including development grant of £56,000 (75% of total eligible development costs).

Joint funded Big Lottery Fund/ Heritage Lottery Fund Parks for People meeting starting at 1.15p.m.

The Chair welcomed the Big Lottery Fund, England Parks for People Committee to the meeting.

28 Parks for People overview

B 2011 (6) 26

The revised Appendices I and II and the minutes of the regional committee meetings were tabled.

The combined total Big Lottery Fund (BIG)/Heritage Lottery Fund grants budget for projects that had received a first round pass in 2010 was £26.7m. Only one second round application had been approved since then and there was one second round decision at the meeting. The percentage split between distributors for this award was HLF 62.5%: BIG 37.5%.

Parks for People applications were returning at second round with an increased grant request. The HLF Board and BIG England Parks for People Committee had agreed that in 2011-12 rather than award the plus 20% at first round as in the previous year, they would only award the actual budget. This was £20m from Heritage Lottery Fund for UK wide parks projects, plus the additional £5m from Big Lottery Fund. This would eliminate competition at second round but would mean the budget could be underspent if projects failed or were considered unsupportable at second round. This however might be offset by future grant increase requests. Applications with an increased grant request at second round would still have to demonstrate value for money.

For applications within England in 2011-2012, the combined total BIG /HLF budget was £21.7m. This included the HLF grants budget of £16.7m and £5m from BIG. The value of first round applications for Parks for People in December was expected to be less than on the present agenda. The HLF Board and BIG England Parks for People Committee agreed to allocate two thirds of their annual budget for first round decisions, giving a budget in the region of £14.5m. The percentage split between distributors would be HLF 77%: BIG 23%. There was high competition for this budget with requests of £28m in England.

Given the high demand for funds and that the total grant request for high priority first round applications was in excess of £17million, the HLF Board and BIG England Parks for People Committee agreed to discuss only projects ranked as a high priority by committees. They considered the medium ranked projects and agreed that Lesnes Abbey Wood (item 45) also merited discussion. They agreed to reject all other applications without discussion.

Trustees commented on the appendices containing the scorings of the applications. They requested that the scores should be included in the future regional and country Parks for People overview paper for presentation at committees.

BIG England Parks Committee members and HLF Trustees would consider cases for decision before voting. Voting would be weighted to reflect the difference in numbers between the HLF Board and BIG England Parks for People Committee.

27 Presentation – Evaluation of Parks for People Programme

B 2011 (6) 27

- A presentation on the initial findings from the evaluation study which was based on 70 projects, ten of which were still in their development phase and only 11 had completed their capital works, was provided. The findings were presented in relation to the key outcomes for the programme which were increasing the range of audiences, conserving diverse heritage, increasing the range of volunteers, improving skills and knowledge through training and improved management and maintenance.

The HLF Board and BIG England Parks for People Committee noted that it was relatively early days in the development of the sample of 70 projects, however, the evidence collected suggested

that on balance the programme was on track to achieve its outcomes. However, projects did need to consider audience and volunteer profiles in more detail and look to target their approaches to engage more hard to reach groups. Officers would consider the initial findings and any implications before deciding how to disseminate this information.

29 a Declarations of Interest

There were no declarations of interest.

Second round applications for discussion and decision (Joint HLF/BIG)

30 Godalming, The Phillips Memorial Park: PP-09-00014 B 2011 (6) 30 DECISION: AWARD GRANT OF £335,000 (76%)

Waverley Borough Council sought a grant to restore Phillips Memorial Park in Godalming. The 4.5 hectare park included cloisters commemorating Jack Phillips, the Chief Wireless Telegraphist on RMS Titanic. The restoration of the cloisters would coincide with the centenary of the Titanic voyage in 2012. The park also included planting areas and an ornamental pond designed by Gertrude Jekyll. It was well-used, and in the town centre Conservation Area. The applicant had received a first round pass of £314,000 including a development grant of £25,600 (73% of total development costs) in June 2010.

The HLF Committee for South East England and BIG Head of Region had recommended the application as a high priority priority.

The HLF Board and BIG England Parks for People Committee awarded a grant of £335,000 (76% of eligible delivery costs) split HLF £209,375 (62.5%) BIG £125,625 (37.5%).

First round applications for discussion and decision (Joint HLF/BIG)

- 31 Wharton Park: PP-10-03366** **B 2011 (6) 31**
DECISION: 1. FIRST ROUND PASS OF £1,545,800, INCLUDING
2. DEVELOPMENT GRANT OF £41,800 (95% OF TOTAL ELIGIBLE DEVELOPMENT COSTS) HLF £32,186 (77%); BIG £9,614 (23%)

Durham County Council sought a first round pass including a development grant towards the refurbishment of 4.3 hectare Wharton Park situated on the city centre of Durham City. The park had a high heritage value and contained several structures including the Grade II Listed Battery. The park was located within the Durham City Centre Conservation Area and the Area of High Landscape Value. The derelict Wharton Park house would be extended and converted into a visitors centre and café providing an educational facility.

The HLF Board and BIG England Parks for People Committee awarded 1. a first round pass of £1,545,800, including a 2. development grant of £41,800 (95% of total eligible development costs) split HLF £32,186 (77%); BIG £9,614 (23%).

- 32 Castle Vale Park and Coronation Park, Berwick upon Tweed: PP-10-03265** **B 2011 (6) 32**
DECISION: 1. FIRST ROUND PASS OF £999,500, INCLUDING
2. DEVELOPMENT GRANT OF £53,200 (93% OF TOTAL ELIGIBLE DEVELOPMENT COSTS) HLF £40,964 (77%); BIG £12,236 (23%)

Northumberland County Council sought a first round pass and a development grant towards the restoration of two distinct Parks; Castle Vale and Coronation Parks located together and adjacent to the town's Castle and train station overlooking the River Tweed. The project would restore key historic features within the Parks such as the lily pond, rose garden and the entrances. A park ranger would be employed, and proposals included engagement of under-represented audiences and provision of a range of volunteer opportunities.

The HLF Board and BIG England Parks for People Committee agreed that this application was a high priority for support and awarded a 1.first round pass of £999,500 including a 2. development grant of £53,200 (93% of total eligible development costs) split HLF £40,964 (77%); BIG £12,236 (23%)

- 33 Moor Park: PP-10-06874** **B 2011 (6) 33**
DECISION: 1. FIRST ROUND PASS OF £1,551,000, INCLUDING
2. DEVELOPMENT GRANT OF £51,000 (75% OF TOTAL ELIGIBLE DEVELOPMENT COSTS) HLF £39,270 (77%); BIG £11,730 (23%)

Preston City Council sought funding towards the redevelopment of Moor Park in the centre of Preston. Key elements of the project in this 40ha, Grade I listed Park included the de-silting of the Serpentine Lake and the reinstatement of historic features such as a bridge across the Lake. The Park, Preston's largest and oldest park, had been the location of many historic events including horseracing during Preston Guild celebrations in the C17th and C18th: Preston Guild was a historic celebration dating back to 1179 held once every twenty years, the only surviving Guild celebration in the UK.

The HLF Board and BIG England Parks for People Committee agreed that Moor Park was a high priority for support and awarded a 1. first round pass of £1,551,000 including a 2. development grant of £51,000 (75% of total eligible project costs) split HLF £39,270 (77%); BIG £11,730 (23%)

- 34 Westgate Gardens and Landscape Beyond, Canterbury: PP-10-06404** **B 2011 (6) 34**
DECISION: 1. FIRST ROUND PASS OF £689,900, INCLUDING

2. DEVELOPMENT GRANT OF £37,600 (69% OF TOTAL ELIGIBLE DEVELOPMENT COSTS) HLF £28,952 (77%); BIG £8,648 (23%)

Canterbury City Council sought a first round pass and a development grant towards a programme of works to upgrade 12 hectare parkland within Westgate Gardens in Canterbury. The visitor experience would be enhanced through better access and interpretation and upgrade of facilities. A community outreach post and training opportunities would be provided.

The HLF Board and BIG England Parks for People Committee agreed that the park was a high priority for support and awarded a 1. first round pass of £689,900 (72%) including, a 2. development grant of £37,600 split HLF £28,952 (77%); BIG £8,648 (23%).

35 Clevedon, Promenade Park: PP-10-00595 B 2011 (6) 35
DECISION: REJECT

North Somerset District Council sought a first round pass of £1,425,500, including a development grant of £65,500 (85% of total eligible development costs) for historic and infrastructure improvements at Clevedon Promenade Park. The project would restore key heritage features, including the Marine Lake and the bandstand, reverse the visual incoherence of the site caused by past ad-hoc interventions and engage the local community in more co-ordinated volunteering roles.

In the light of the available budget, the HLF Board and BIG England Parks for People Committee rejected the application.

36 Torquay, Cockington Country Park: PP-10-05869 B 2011 (6) 36
DECISION: REJECT

Torbay Coast and Countryside Trust sought a first round pass of £2,890,900 including a development grant of £140,000 (90% of total eligible development costs) for works at Cockington Country Park, between Torquay and Paignton. Works included improved physical access, lake restoration, the creation of a natural play area and the reintroduction of grazing. Existing buildings would be converted for use as a visitor centre and an education centre. Events and activities would be planned, including those targeted at Torbay's disadvantaged communities.

In the light of the available budget, the HLF Board and BIG England Parks for People Committee rejected the application.

37 Brinton Park: PP-10-03809 B 2011 (6) 37
DECISION: REJECT

Wyre Forest District Council sought a first round pass of £714,500 including a development grant of £98,300 (90% of total eligible project costs) towards the restoration and refurbishment of Brinton Park situated on the south-west edge of Kidderminster in Worcestershire. The Park contained the, previously restored, Grade II listed Richard Eve Memorial.

In the light of the available budget, the HLF Board and BIG England Parks for People Committee rejected the application.

38 Lightwoods Park: PP-10-07371 B 2011 (6) 38
DECISION: 1. FIRST ROUND PASS OF £2,750,900, INCLUDING
2. DEVELOPMENT GRANT OF £250,900 (82% OF TOTAL ELIGIBLE DEVELOPMENT COSTS) HLF £193,193 (77%); BIG £57,707 (23%)

Sandwell Metropolitan Borough Council (SMBC) sought funding towards the restoration of Lightwoods Park located in Bearwood and to deliver a programme of learning and participation

opportunities. The 11.8ha Park contained the disused and deteriorating Grade II listed Lightwoods House and a C19th bandstand which had been identified by English Heritage as a 'building at risk'.

Overall, the project was considered a high priority for support but in light of the wider and budgetary considerations was rejected.

Of the remaining cases, the HLF Board and BIG England Parks for People Committee agreed that all were a high priority for support except for *Lesnes Abbey Wood* (item 45) which they considered a medium priority for support.
